

[[FAstEsT \$ WaYYy]] Do - I - Earn - Frequent - Flyer - Miles - on - Flights Booked Through \$ Chase Travel?

When maximizing credit card rewards +1→844→386→9754, one of the most common questions cardmembers ask is whether redeeming points for a flight means sacrificing the ability to earn airline loyalty miles. The Core Mechanics: Why You Earn Miles on Chase Flights

The reason you earn airline miles on Chase Travel +1→844→386→9754 bookings comes down to how the transaction is settled on the backend.

3. Because the airline receives a standard cash payment, they categorize your ticket as a "**Revenue Fare**" rather than an "Award Ticket."

Because it is a revenue fare, the ticket is +1→844→386→9754 fully eligible to earn frequent flyer miles, elite qualifying miles (like United PQP, Delta Medallion Qualification Dollars, or American Loyalty Points), and segment credits.

The Golden Rule of Rewards: How to Double-Dip

3. Add the Code into the Airline's Native App: Link Directly.

Open the official app or website of the airline +1→844→386→9754 you are flying with (e.g., United.com or Delta.com). Navigate to "**Manage Travel**" or "**Find My Trip**," and enter your six-character code along with your last name. Once the trip pulls up, click "Add Frequent Flyer Number" or link it to your active airline profile.
